ECUADOR

The National Government presented the new Organic Code for Labor Relations to replace the Labor Code. The Ministry of Labor held conversations with employers' and workers' representatives to present the general guidelines of the new Code without explaining the content in detail. This has led to employers and workers expressing concerns on changes included within the new Organic Code related to trade unions per economic activity, salary levels and working adolescents among other.

Also, the Government presented the proposal for the 2014 National Budget to the Congress. With a budget amounting to a total of \$34,300 million calculated on a basis of an average oil price at USD 86.4 per barrel, the proposal includes increases in the allocations for health and education.

Finally, Elections for Autonomous Governments in Ecuador were held on February 23rd, where the candidates representing the party in government lost in key cities such as Guayaquil, Quito and Cuenca. As a result, the National Government has made changes in several institutions, including the Ministry of Labor where the minister was replaced by Mr. Carlos Marx Carrasco. Nevertheless, the officials responsible for child labor in the Ministry remains and will continue in charge of these issues.

PANAMA

On December 4th, 2013, the Electoral Tribunal issued the Official Notice for General Elections for President, Congress representatives and District Representatives to be held May 4th, 2014. December 30th, 2013 the Government established the new Minimum Wage Rates for 2014. The rates increased the minimum wage within a range between 58 and 136 dollars. Nevertheless, trade unions and employer's representatives noted that the new rates were not resulting from a consensus reached through consultations and dialogue, and thus only represented the interest of the National Government.

The Executive Decree for establishing the country's Roadmap for Early Childhood was approved on February 6th, 2014. The National Council for the Integral Attention of Early Childhood was created by the Decree and will be integrated by representatives from the National Government and Civil Society. The main purpose of the Council is the definition of work plans, supporting the establishment of a standard for services, follow up methods for end-users among other responsibilities.

The Government authorized the signing of a Loan Contract between Panama and the Development Bank of Latin America (CAF) for up to US\$100 million. The purpose of the loan is to provide resources for the Programme for the Widening and Modernization of Education (PAMIE). Through the PAMIE, the Ministry of Education (MEDUCA) is looking to improve educational facilities, building 20 Comprehensive Schools, that will provide services for more than 28,000 students at pre-school, primary and high school levels.

Finally, the political campaign for general elections (President, Congress, Local Representatives and Municipalities) is heating up. Mass media is full of proposals and counter-proposals from candidates as well as attacks on the contenders from rivals. Many public officials are pessimistic about their permanence in the public service structure after the elections. Several Ministers have withdrawn from their duties to dedicate themselves full time to the political campaign.

Efficiency

• The project has achieved important results in both countries. Even though political conditions have slowed advances somewhat, the team has made the best possible effort to mainstream child labour activities into the strategies of public institutions. As project implementing time is progressing further results will be achieved as processes started in the first year of implementation come to their conclusion.

Effectiveness

• Activities of the project has been developed in close coordination with national and local stakeholders. Activities at the local level are more advanced in Panama than Ecuador, but this is expected to be levelled soon. At the national level, results have been achieved more easily in Panama due to the Government's need to demonstrate results before the elections of May 2014. Political conditions both in Ecuador and Panama have been periodically unstable but tending after each "crisis" to become stable and regular again.

Relevance

• The general strategy of the project has proven to be highly relevant. The project is working to build linkages between public policies and project outputs. On that basis, the project has identified key outcomes for demonstrating the effects of project interventions on changes in the conditions in Ecuador and Panama.

Sustainability

• Coordination with public agencies and key stakeholders in Ecuador and Panama was slow but focussed on capacity building. The project is also establishing coordination mechanisms to identify how its strategy can contribute to the further development of public policies on Child Labour. Collaboration with employer's organizations in Panama and with the Network of Enterprises in Ecuador demonstrated that building on synergies generates wider effects at the country level.

ECUADOR

- The country does not have specific data demonstrating the relationship between child labour and disabilities. On that basis, the project sees an opportunity for proposing institutional strategies focusing on that relationship, generating data and public policies for addressing the issue of child labour and disabilities.
- Local Governments are highly interested in coordinating actions with the project, in particular
 considering the use of knowledge and tools specifically developed for addressing child labour
 issues at the local level.
- The initiative for operating virtual communities for sharing information, training and promoting debate on the eradication of child labour received positive feedback from stakeholders, opening the opportunity for widening the approach of the initiative.
- The ILO is developing interventions related to youth employment that contribute to the creation of an enabling environment for the provision of better services for involving adolescents in safe jobs as an alternative for hazardous child labour.

PANAMA

- Synergies between projects operating in the Darien region promoted by the Secretary for the Sustainable Development of Darien and surrounding indigenous territories and the US Embassy in Panama offer the possibility for complementing actions between public agencies and civil society organizations.
- Coordination with UNICEF and IOM in the framework of the UN Country Team will allow the
 project to complement public policy recommendations related to child labour for indigenous
 peoples and migrants.

Of particular note this period are the advances in providing technical assistance to the Governments of Ecuador and Panama. USDOL would like to thank project staff for organizing the successful project launch in Panama and for its cooperation in the recent GAO audit. Additionally USDOL would like to thank the project for submitting the revised PMP, and we will be providing feedback soon.

USDOL would like the project staff to address the following questions.

Questions and Clarifications

Please provide a response before December 31, 2013:

- 1) USDOL looks forward to receiving information on collaborative activities identified with the Panama-Ecuador Services Project.
 - Partners of the Americas and the ILO held conversations for identifying collaborative activities that can be developed by 2014. On that basis, proposed activities are listed below:
- Regularly inform the National Steering Committee (CETIPPAT) on advances from both projects in Panama. CETIPPAT will be informed during its regular meetings on: January, April, July and October.
- Regularly inform the National Steering Committee (Mesa Técnica Interinstitucional) on advances from both projects in Ecuador. The Mesa Técnica will be informed during its regular meetings on: February, May, August and November.
- Regularly inform local authorities on advances from both projects in Ecuador and Panama. Local authorities will be informed during this periods: Ecuador (May and November); Panama (April and October).
- Consultancy on Child Labor and Educational Policies. As the results will be relevant for both projects, collaboration will begin with a Videoconference that will be held in January and will involve both Education Ministries in Ecuador and Panama.

- Videoconferences on different topics related to child labor. Four international videoconferences —that will include Ecuador, Panama and other countries—will be developed through the year.

For the next TPR:

2) USDOL looks forward to receiving information on the consultations with the Governments of Ecuador and Panama on vocational training courses.

The Project initially held consultations with vocational training authorities and received a negative response. As an alternative, the Project began conversations with the Ministry of Education. But despite the constant request of information and the need for the definition of a focal point for the project, it was not possible to establish agreements on the issue of vocational training for adolescents.

In October 2013, the ILO established an agreement with SECAP for the provision of training courses for young people (including adolescents). This action moved the discussion from whether adolescents should be in vocational training to the type of training that can be offered to this age group. The Project will use this relationship to promote the training of adolescents and the provision of services for transferring them from hazardous activities to safe work.

3) Additionally, USDOL would appreciate an update on progress of the updated list of hazardous activities.

The process for reviewing and updating the list of hazardous activities officially began in November in Panama. The first step was a workshop for training a multidisciplinary team of representatives from different public agencies (Labor, Agriculture, Fishing, Health, and Social Security), employers' and workers' organizations. The process was developed during the months of November through February and included specific workshops with employers and workers organizations with the purpose of collecting inputs for the updated list. The final draft was officially validated in March 2014 and the Ministry of Labor will promote its formal adoption by May 2014. In Ecuador, the process began in March 2014 and will use the experience and lessons learned in Panama.

4) USDOL would like an update on the issue of disabilities at the policy level in Ecuador as well as any additional information on consultations with the office of the Sub Secretary for Disabilities.

The Disabilities Policy in Ecuador –after the resignation of Vice-president Lenin Moreno – has suffered important changes both at the level of coverage as well as institutionally. One of the most important changes is the de-concentration of actions that were developed by the Vice-president's Office and that are now divided in two main areas. Public policy design and implementation, which is now the responsibility of the Technical Sub Secretariat for Disabilities (SETEDIS) (Part of the Social Inclusion Vice-ministry); while the other main area is the provision of health services, which is the responsibility of the Ministry of Health.

One of the most controversial decisions of SETEDIS is the requirement for people with disabilities to re-certify their condition, a decision which has put them in conflict with civil society organizations responsible for promoting the rights of people with disabilities and led to discredit their work both within and outside the Government.

In this context, discussing an approach to child labour with SETEDIS has not been possible and it has been difficult to keep a fluid communication on this subject. The project has –informally – been informed that SETEDIS will disappear and its responsibilities will be assumed by MIES.

Why was/is this programme done? What happened in the project and why?

- Panama has a multi-year strategy for eradicating Child Labour aligned with objectives 15 and 16 of the Decent Work Hemispheric Agenda for the Americas. The strategy known as the Roadmap for making Panama a Child Labour free country requires annual work plans aligned with priorities identified in the Government plan and to achieve specific results every year that can be accountable. The main challenge is to identify a strategy that could lead to budgetary commitments from public agencies and to establish a coordinated action with civil society including employers and workers organizations as well as NGOs.
- The Government developed a first three-year plan that demonstrated difficulties on aligning priorities of key public agencies with Child Labour goals. Then the Project developed a methodology for identifying resources and linkages from public agencies with objectives and results proposed in the Roadmap. Focusing on the budget eliminated the discussion on feasibility and allowed a straight forward process that allowed to build in a short term an annual plan that fully integrates within the Government's plans.

Situation in which it is applicable.

The practice is applicable in cases where the country has a multi-year plan with objectives, results and
activities already defined and requires the definition of annual work plans that involves budgetary resources
from public agencies.

Key outcomes of applying best practice.

• The main outcome is that public agencies internally review their priorities and resources that can be used for Child Labour eradication actions and empower them to identify synergies and coordination with other agencies (both public and private) with the main purpose of improving effectiveness.

Critical success factors in leading to good practice.

- First, integrate a team from different departments responsible for both operational, programming and financial duties that would discuss feasibility for allocating resources for Child Labour eradication activities.
- Second, defining clear guidelines for the internal process and mechanisms for integrating their approach in the country's annual plan for implementing the Roadmap.

Key conditions for good practice.

• Once priorities and budget allocations have been defined, active participation and discussion with other stakeholders is essential for assuring an integral approach to the Annual Workplan.

Key initiatives do be taken.

 Make arrangements at the highest level of decision-making for supporting the process. Make the political leadership aware of the methodology and expected results and have them issue specific guidelines for developing the annual programming.

Why is it a good practice?

• It is a good practice because the project used the procedures already in place by public agencies thus making it easier for them to identify their contributions to the country's strategy for the eradication of child labour.

Why could it be replicated elsewhere?

• Several countries have multi-year plans for the eradication of child labour and this type of programming process developed by the project can be useful in such a context.

How could it be used by other programmes?

• Other programmes can use materials developed by the project and the guidelines defined in the process. In fact, the project will use the methodology to develop the next Annual Program with the new authorities after the elections in May 2014.

What would you tell designers and implementers of other programmes to look out for when applying this good practice?

• To look forward for endorsement from the highest political authorities before starting the process. Political commitment is crucial for achieving results.
