# **BERMUDA**

Region: Americas

**Income group**: High income

**Summary**: Bermuda has reported 3 metadata sources, which collect information on international labour migration statistics: the *Census of Population and Housing*, the *Labour Force Survey*, and the *Annual Employment Survey*, all of which are carried out by the Bermuda Government Department of Statistics.

Geographically all of the sources cover whole country, however different population groups such as:

- Nationals (citizens) in the country (covered by the Census of Population and Housing and the Labour Force Survey),
- Nationals (citizens) employed in the country (covered by the **Census of Population and Housing** and the **Labour Force Survey**),
- Nationals (citizens) living abroad (covered by the Census of Population and Housing),
- Foreigners (non-citizens) living in the country (covered by the Census of Population and Housing and the Labour Force Survey),
- Foreign workers (non-citizens) living in the country (covered by the Census of Population and Housing and the Labour Force Survey),
- Refugees (covered by the Census of Population and Housing), and
- Asylum seekers (covered by the Census of Population and Housing).

The Annual Employment Survey appraises all economic establishments of any size.

Periodicity of data collection varies depending on the type of sources. The *Census of Population and Housing* was last processed in 2010; the *Labour Force Survey* is carried out annually starting from 2009; and the *Annual Employment Survey* is held every year since 1978.

The *Census of Population and Housing* covers persons aged 12 years and over and the *Labour Force Survey* collects persons aged 16 years and over.

The two essential demographic characteristics covered by all the sources are age and sex. Data on marital status and household size can also be found in the *Census of Population and Housing* and the *Labour Force Survey*. In the *Census of Population and Housing* question on educational attainment is added.

International migration characteristic covered by the *Census of Population and Housing* is country of birth, whereas nationality can be found in the *Labour Force Survey* and the *Annual Employment Survey*. The *Census of Population and Housing* asks information about household members and their characteristics who left to live, work or study abroad for the last 12 months and collects information on immigrants and return migrants.

Labour related characteristics such as occupation, status in employment, and hours usually worked are available in all the sources. Additionally, the *Census of Population and Housing* and the *Labour Force Survey* generate data on employment status, industry/economic sector, disability, individual earnings per month, and household income. The *Labour Force Survey* also includes questions on months worked in past year, whether person has had an occupational injury, and possible benefits.

Definitions of "international migrant workers", "nationals living abroad", "employment", "short-term migrant workers", and "wages" are applied in the sources.

To classify occupation, industry, status in employment, and education national adaptations of international classifications are used in the sources.

Micro data is unavailable for research and analysis outside the agency.

# Findings:

The latest *Census of Population and Housing* was processed in 2010 by the Bermuda Government Department of Statistics, covering the whole country. There are seven population groups examined in the Census:

- Nationals (citizens) in the country,
- Nationals (citizens) employed in the country,
- Nationals (citizens) living abroad,
- Foreigners (non-citizens) living in the country,
- Foreign workers (non-citizens) living in the country,
- Refugees, and
- Asylum seekers.

The census obtains detailed data on demographic characteristics of these population groups, such as age, sex, marital status, educational attainment, and household size. The question raised in the assessment on the topic of international migration related characteristics is country of birth. The census contains questions, which help to collect information on immigrants and return migrants such as "Have you ever lived outside the country?" and "when did you arrive in this country?" In addition to the characteristics, the census asks information about household members who left to live, work or study abroad for the last 12 months, such as:

- Name
- Month/year of departure,
- Sex.
- Main reason for leaving,
- Age at time of leaving household,
- Age at present,
- Education at time of leaving, and
- Occupation at time of leaving.

The **2010** Census of Population and Housing covers labour related characteristics of all current household members aged 12 years and over, such as:

- Employment status,
- Occupation,
- Industry/economic sector,

- Status in employment,
- Hours usually worked,
- Disability,
- Individual earnings per month, and
- Household income.

"International migrant workers" refer to foreign-born workers whose country of birth are not Bermuda and work in Bermuda. "National living abroad" is who have lived outside of Bermuda for one year or more. They are deemed to be an emigrant with the exception of students. "Employment" refers to the population aged 12 years and over works for pay/ payment in kind.

To classify occupation, industry, and education, both internationally and nationally adapted classifications are applied. For example:

- National adaptation of ISCO (ISCO-88 as the model for the BSCO-07) (where four digits are used to release the data);
- National adaptation of ISIC (where five digits are used to release the data); and
- National adaptation of ISCED.

Micro data is unavailable for research and analysis outside the agency.

The *Labour Force Survey* commenced in 2009, and is held on yearly basis by the Bermuda Government Department of Statistics. A completed sample size of the examination is 1,500 households. It geographically measures the whole country and amasses information on the following four population groups aged 16 years old and over.

- Nationals (citizens) in the country,
- Nationals (citizens) employed in the country,
- Foreigners (non-citizens) living in the country, and
- Foreign workers (non-citizens) living in the country.

The survey obtains detailed data on demographic characteristics of each person in a household, such as age, sex, marital status, and household size. Statistics on the international migration related characteristics presented through the source is nationality foreign workers in the country.

For the population groups assessed in the *Labour Force Survey*, the data on labour related characteristics of all current household members aged 16 years and over is available, particularly for:

- Employment status,
- Occupation,
- Industry/economic sector,
- Status in employment,
- Individual earnings per month,
- Household income,
- Hours usually worked,
- Months worked in past year,
- Whether person has had an occupational injury, and
- Whether person has had disability.

The survey also includes questions on the possible benefits received from the employer, such as health insurance or subsidized health care.

"International migrant workers" refer to any workers, according to the Bermuda Immigration and Protection Act, hold or should hold work permit approval in order to work in Bermuda. These are typically non-Bermudians who are not a spouse of a Bermudian nor hold a Permanent Resident Certificate. "Employment" is a situation of persons

16 years of age or older who supplied labour for the production of goods and services during the survey reference week in return for pay in money or in kind.

To classify occupation, industry, and status in employment, both internationally and nationally adapted classifications are applied. For example:

- National adaptation of ISCO-08 (where two digits are used to release the data);
- National adaptation of ISIC rev 3 (where two digits are used to release the data); and
- National adaptation of ICSE 1993.

Micro data is unavailable for research and analysis outside the agency.

The *Annual Employment Survey* was last carried out in 2014 by the Bermuda Government Department of Statistics. The statistics are collected annually starting from 1978, geographically covering the whole country. The Census appraises all economic establishments of any size and covers the following topics for the establishment:

- Industry/economic sector, and
- Number of employees

The questions raised in the assessment on the topic of demographic and international migration related characteristics are age, sex, and nationality. The Annual Employment Survey covers labour related characteristics, such as:

- Occupation,
- Status in employment, and
- Hours actually worked.

"International migrant workers" refer to any workers, according to the Bermuda Immigration and Protection Act, hold or should hold work permit approval in order to work in Bermuda. These are typically non-Bermudians who are not a spouse of a Bermudian nor hold a Permanent Resident Certificate. "Employment" refers to persons aged 16 years and older who supplied labour for the production of goods and services during the survey reference week in return for a pay in money or in kind. "Short-term migrant workers" are persons with work permit approval for a period of less than or equal to three months. "Wages" refer to gross annual income (before mandatory deductions) from employment paid to wage earning workers.

To classify occupation, industry, and status in employment, nationally adapted classifications are applied. For example:

- National adaptation of ISCO-08;
- National adaptation of ISIC rev 3; and
- National adaptation of ICSE 1993.
