# ISLE OF MAN

Region: Europe and Central Asia

**Income group**: High income

**Summary**: Isle of Man has reported 2 metadata sources, which collect information on international labour migration statistics. There are the census of the *Isle of Man Census* carried out by the Economic Affairs, Cabinet Office and one administrative record of the *Isle of Man Work Permits* held by the Department for Economic Development.

Geographically all the sources cover whole country, however different population groups such as:

- Nationals (citizens) in the country (covered by the **Isle of Man Census**)
- Nationals (citizens) employed in the country (covered by the **Isle of Man Census**)
- Foreigners (non-citizens) living in the country (covered by the Isle of Man Census)
- Foreign workers (non-citizens) living in the country (covered by the Isle of Man Census and the Isle of Man Work Permits)

Periodicity of data collection varies depending on the type of source. The *Isle of Man Census* was last processed in 2011 and the record of the *Isle of Man Work Permits* is released on continuously basis.

The record of the *Isle of Man Work Permits* is applied to persons of all ages.

The three essential demographic characteristics covered by both the sources are age, sex, and marital status. Data on educational attainment and household size can also be found in the census.

International migration characteristics covered by both the sources are country of birth and country of previous residence. Additionally the *Isle of Man Work Permits* asks questions on country of citizenship and information on immigrants and return migrants including the situation of the persons around the time prior to leaving the household. Data on year of arrival, nationality, and country of origin is recorded in the *Isle of Man Work Permits* too.

Labour related characteristics such as employment status, occupation, industry/economic sector, and status in employment are available in the census.

Definitions of "international migrant workers", "nationals living abroad", and "employment" are applied in the sources.

To classify occupation, industry, status in employment, and education the *Isle of Man Work Permits* applies internationally and nationally adapted classifications.

Micro data from the Isle of Man Census are available for research and analysis outside the agency.

#### **Findings:**

The latest *Isle of Man Census* was processed in 2011 by the Economic Affairs, Cabinet Office covering the whole country. There are four population groups examined in the Census:

- *Nationals (citizens) in the country,*
- Nationals (citizens) employed in the country,
- Foreigners (non-citizens) living in the country, and
- Foreign workers (non-citizens) living in the country.

The census obtains detailed data on demographic characteristics such as age, sex, marital status, educational attainment, and household size. The questions raised in the assessment on the topic of international migration related characteristics are country of birth, country of citizenship, and country of previous residence for foreigners. The census contains questions, which help to collect information on immigrants and return migrants such as "Have you ever lived outside the country?" and "when did you arrive in this country?" And the data on reason for choosing to migrate to this country of the person around the time prior to leaving the household last time are obtained.

The *Isle of Man Census* covers labour related characteristics of all current household members aged 15 years and over such as: employment status, occupation, industry/Economic sector, and status in employment.

The 2011 Isle of Man Census utilises a Work Permit system, whereby anyone who has not been resident on the Isle of Man for 5 years is required to have a work permit. This is how "International migrant workers" are determined in the Isle of Man. After the 5 year period, the worker is no longer classified as a foreign worker and is considered to be a Manx Worker. "Nationals living abroad" that we ask to be included only relates to university students attending university in the United Kingdom. To measure "Employment" is defined as those who was an employee, on a Government approved training scheme, paid/unpaid self-employed/freelance, or in their own/a family business in the last week. This included anyone on maternity leave, holiday or temporarily laid off.

To classify occupation, industry, status in employment, and education, both internationally and nationally adapted classifications are applied. For example:

- National adaptation of ISCO (Office for National Statistics SOC2010);
- National adaptation of ISIC (Office for National Statistics SIC2011);
- ICSE-1993; and
- ISCED-1997.

Micro data are the source available for research and analysis outside the agency.

The *Isle of Man Work Permits* is a register of work permits issued to foreign workers from the Department for Economic Development and released continuously. The source appraises whole country and collects only one population group of all ages.

• Foreigners (non-citizens) living in the country.

In the register, data can be found on demographic characteristics such as age, sex, and marital status. International migration related characteristics accessible through the source are:

- Country of birth,
- Year of arrival,
- Nationality,
- Country of origin, and
- Country of previous residence.

"International migrant workers" are defined as foreign workers who are required to obtain a work permit on the Isle of Man. Anyone not born on the Isle of Man, or has not been resident here for over 5 years is required to have a work permit, which can either be issued for a fixed term or indefinitely.

Micro data are unavailable for research and analysis outside the agency.

**Definition of national living abroad**: For the Isle of Man Census, the only nationals living abroad that we ask to be included relates to university students attending university in the United Kingdom

**Definition of employment**: It is defined as those who was an employee, on a Government approved training scheme, paid/unpaid self-employed/freelance, or in their own/a family business in the last week. This included anyone on maternity leave, holiday or temporarily laid off.
