EIGHTH ITEM ON THE AGENDA

Use of the 2000-01 surplus

- **1.** At its 285th Session (November 2002) the Governing Body approved proposals on allocations of the 2000-01 surplus under the authority that had been delegated to it by the International Labour Conference. In the discussion on the 2000-01 surplus, the Office committed itself to provide financial information and the results framework for all new allocations in the format used in Appendix III of GB.285/PFA/9.
- 2. In keeping with this commitment, this document provides financial information and the results-based framework for all new allocations made under the 2000-01 surplus since last reported in November 2002. The information is provided in three appendices. Appendix I provides an overview of the allocations made under the 2000-01 surplus as at 30 September 2003. Appendix II provides a summary of procedures developed by the Office to ensure that proposals are approved in observance of the criteria set out in Appendix II of GB.285/PFA/9. Appendix III contains information on the results-based framework for all new allocations. In most cases, the newly approved work items were developed by further refining those proposals previously reported as being under development.
- **3.** The Programme Implementation Report submitted in March of each year will provide information on the implementation of work funded by the 2000-01 surplus. The report will highlight some milestones reached by surplus-funded projects and, moreover, will describe the "value-added" of surplus funding to ongoing work under the programme and budget.

Appendix II

Summary of procedures for approval

In keeping with commitments made ¹ that no expenditure would be incurred without the prior approval of the Director-General, and furthermore, that "criteria set forward in paragraph 2 of the paper in Appendix II would be rigorously applied" ² the Office has established a strict approval process with explicit appraisal criteria. It involves the following steps.

1. Submission

Responsible units, after consultation with constituents and relevant programmes at headquarters and in the regions, submit a project proposal providing background, problem analysis, project description (objectives, results, strategy, target group, risks and assumptions), and implementation arrangements. These proposals also include a standardized form that requires summary information on: (1) how the project will respond to new demands and opportunities; (2) the time frame for implementation; (3) the budget; (4) the results-based framework; and (5) project milestones against which the project targets will be measured and progress reported.

2. Project appraisal

All significant aspects of the proposal are reviewed by the Bureau of Programming and Management, which consults the preparing unit and others concerned. Appraisal criteria are based on those set out in GB.285/PFA/9. These include relevance to the social partners and national priorities, technical and financial feasibility, presence of a sound performance management framework, coherence and integration of the proposal to ongoing work under the regular budget and extra-budgetary resources.

3. Adjustments/finalization

Proposing units make adjustments to their proposals according to appraisal results.

4. Consideration by the Director-General

Proposals are considered by the Director-General for funding. Additional adjustments to proposals may be required before approval.

5. Documentation and reporting

After approval, responsible units are required to report: (a) every six months on project expenditure; and (b) annually on their milestones. These are then checked against the original proposals to assess progress.

Results will be reported each year in the Programme Implementation Reports (March sessions of the Governing Body).

Informal economy: Employers' and workers' organizations provide increased representation and services to the informal economy.

Poverty Reduction Strategy Papers: Employers' and workers' organizations participate in and influence national PRSP processes.

New targets and allocations

Targets: Workers' and employers' organizations are able to provide services to support the

implementation of the Global Compact. National promotional meetings will be held in at least three countries involving employers' organizations for 2003. Guidelines will be established for trade unions to assist in collection of best practice examples

on trade union participation in the Global Compact in 2003.

Allocation: US\$504,600.

Time frame: To be completed by June 2005.
